## MODIFICATION OF THE RESOLUTION ECO 432-2012: Beverage obtained by dealcoholisation of wine

## THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY

IN VIEW of the article 2, paragraph 2 iii of the Agreement of 3rd April 2001, establishing the International Organisation of Vine and Wine,

CONSIDERING the works conducted by the experts' groups TECHNO on the specific oenological practices and DROCON on definition of products derived from grapes, musts or wine,

CONSIDERING the need to avoid possible confusion of products whether categorised as "wine" or "beverage", allowing to define corresponding oenological practices.

CONSIDERING the decision of Scientific and Technical Committee of April 2023 regarding the necessity for amendments by DROCON on the resolution of OIV-ECO 432-2012 to change the title as "dealcoholised wine",

ON THE PROPOSAL of the Commission Economy and Law,

DECIDES to modify the title of the resolution ECO 432-2012 "Beverage obtained by dealcoholisation of wine" by "Dealcoholised Wine" and consequently the file 6.9 in Part I, Chapter 6 of the International Code of Oenological Practices as follows (strikethrough text is to be deleted and text in bold italics is to be added) as follows:

## Chapter 6: Products derived from grapes, musts or wine

## 6.9 Dealcoholised wine

Dealcoholised wine is a product:

- obtained exclusively from wine or special wine as described in the International Code of oenological practices of the OIV;
- which has undergone exclusively specific for this type of products treatments in accordance with the OIV International Code of Oenological practices, in particular a dealcoholisation;

• and with an alcoholic strength by volume below or equal 0,5% vol.

Note: This resolution defines the product category only, and does not address labelling or promotional information. Member states may provide for the use of alternative terminology to describe dealcoholised wines on the basis of their alcoholic strength.
