

Paris 2nd May 1890

Dear Domingos Julio

I have received Domingos letters & have not replied having been busy here. I enclose the Invoices for S. Ruy Barbosa, Dobbert, & Carlitz. which please receive the amount & pay to Samuel Bori in Rio.

You will understand I had to send all these articles because I intended to leave here end of April, & consequently all was ordered & was ready in time & had of course to be paid here. My voyage having been detained & I could not do otherwise than send, as I knew positively I could not avoid the duties on account of the initials which are not mine; besides this I have already different things to take with me, & that the amount I would have had to pay on board for extra luggage would have been more than the freight paid on the case. So please explain these circumstances to S. Barbosa, Dobbert & Carlitz & when the case was ready I was still in doubt when my departure would take place exactly. The case is addressed as you will see to S. Barbosa.

As soon as they arrived here I & all of us have been to see them several times, they are now living close to us 5 minutes walk since yesterday & now Marietta, who knows Paris well, will take D. Camilla to walk as she says she likes to walk, & Marietta, walk for 2 or 3 hours nearly every day & this does her a good deal of good.

Your Akema has not been improving in her health, she has been 'Cajorr' since she arrived she always has had something to prevent her to improve in her health. I have consulted

Henrique runs the whole way up, every time he has to go up. Goodbye my sons. Embarras to Jacobina & all the family, Bellinha.
