Overall purpose and context

Countries in Latin America and the Caribbean (LAC) have not only been among the most affected in the world by the COVID-19 pandemic in socio-economic terms, but also in terms of the length of school closures. As schools resume operations, LAC countries face the urgent challenge to address students' learning losses and to re-engage those that dropped out from education or those that are at risk of doing so. Despite the difficulties ahead, the crisis has also presented an opportunity for countries: the opportunity to re-invent education so it can be the driver of strong, inclusive and sustainable economic development and the tissue underpinning equitable communities and societies.

Seizing this opportunity will require the development and implementation of smart education policies that reconcile new goals with old commitments, foster innovation while learning from past experiences, leverage existing capacity and resources to deliver quality learning opportunities, and reconfigure the spaces, the people, the time and the technologies to offer all learners the opportunity to succeed in life.

The LAC Conference of Education Ministers is an opportunity for education ministers and other high-level government officials in the region to look backwards, deriving lessons from the past two years; forward, considering the future that they want for their countries in the medium- and long-term; and outwards, learning from the experience of peers in the region.

To support this reflection, Ministers will be invited to focus on four key policy areas that will be the basis for a strong and inclusive recovery:

- 1. Rethinking the content of learning and disseminating effective pedagogical approaches to make education more relevant;
- 2. Reconfiguring the spaces in which teaching, and learning occur, to empower practitioners and learners, and to encourage constructive relationships that foster collaboration and innovation;
- 3. Leveraging the potential of technology to promote improvements;
- 4. Delivering value for money by allocating education resources in ways that support quality, equity and inclusion.

Session 1: Re-designing the learning experience to strengthen its relevance to students and support the development of 21st century skills
